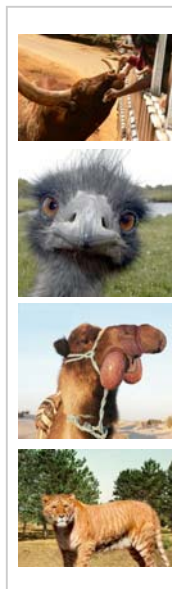
## Wild Animal Safari: A Meet and Greet Affair

## Director's Note: Making a Difference

As Director, I often read reports about the academic struggles so many of our youth face, and I wonder what we can do to help turn the situation around. But then we finish another year like 2006-2007 when we helped 108 students, and we find in the feedback offered by parents, administrators, volunteers, and teachers that the situation is changing for the better for students engaged in *Reading Saturday*.

The year-end academic data we compile is instructive, but the information I look forward to most is the observations of parents and school personnel. What changes do they see? Is *Reading Saturday* making a difference? Though we are just one factor in the progress of our students, it is encouraging when parents and school staff conclude that *Reading Saturday* has had a significant impact on student performance.

The comments as well as our assessment data once again confirm that *Reading Saturday* is aiding student development by encouraging a strong love of learning, improving reading skills, and increasing both self-confidence and all-around academic success.

As we look to next year, we hope to increase our final enrollment to 150 and introduce a new theatrical reading component for second and third grade students, created in collaboration with TellTale Theater. We are also working with Communities in Schools of Marietta/Cobb to add a parenting support program designed to enhance student skills through parent involvement. Additionally, we will welcome students from Clay Elementary for the first time,

expanding our service in Cobb County.

Of course, each of these changes is contingent on an infusion of appropriate funding. We are delighted to announce continued funding through the Cobb County Development Block Grant Office (\$26,000), Weber Family Foundation (\$12,000), and Target Stores (\$6,000) for 2007-2008. New sources of support include the Marietta City Community Development Block Grant Office (\$21,000).

Our campaign is on-going. Since October 2006, we have partnered with Merocuné Marketing & Public Relations ([merocune.com](http://merocune.com)) to pursue new and continued avenues of funding. Merocuné Marketing has also worked with us to introduce a new graphic identity for Omosaze, launch a wholly revised web site ([omosaze.org](http://omosaze.org)), and publish a new brochure and other supportive marketing, donor, and volunteer materials. These and other steps being taken by our Board of Directors will help prepare Omosaze for the next phase of growth and development.

On page 3 you will find a few of the many comments we received from parents of *Reading Saturday* students. Each reflection inspires us to continue providing effective and enjoyable after-school help to students who are at risk of academic failure. The success stories are a tribute to Omosaze's incredibly dedicated staff and volunteers, the commitment from participating schools, and the steady support of our community friends and partners. Thank you for making a difference for us so that we can empower more youth to succeed through reading.

Each session, students from A.L. Burruss and Dunleith Elementary descended on the Dunleith campus to begin a three hour intensive, yet delightful and positive reading experience. Students were placed by grade level (1<sup>st</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup>) to develop research-based reading strategies and word building skills. The first grade students benefited from 'buddy' reading with the *Reading Saturday* volunteers, as well.

I was very fortunate to see many first grade students I taught during the week participate in the program. It gave me a firsthand look at their progress. Not only did they improve their reading skills, they progressed as problem solvers. They became assertive learners, ready and confident to face any academic challenge. This was truly spellbinding to see!

The entire *Reading Saturday* experience empowered me as a teacher as much as it empowered the students as learners. I hope to see many more students benefit from this program next year and in years to come. The Omosaze *Reading Saturday* program is an investment worthy of support.
